2023 COMMUNITY SURVEY FINAL REPORT

DESCRIPTION:

Godbe Research was commissioned by Kern Council of Governments (COG) to conduct the 2023 Community Survey.

DISCUSSION:

The 2023 Survey is the thirteenth telephone survey conducted for Kern COG in as many years. The Survey was designed to track the results of all of the previous telephone surveys.

Overall, 1,282 adult residents in Kern County completed the community survey, representing a total universe of 654,323 adult residents 18 or older. Interviews were conducted in either Spanish or English depending on the preference of the resident surveyed. Interviews were conducted from February 13 through February 26, 2023. Data collection was as follows: 141 landlines, 211 cell phones, 930 online from text invitations. In order to allow segmentation of results by region, the areas of the county were sampled as follows: 62 in West Kern, 1001 in the Central Valley, 93 in the Mountain regions, and 126 in East Kern.

DESCRIPTION

Consideration of a Memorandum of Agreement between Kern Council of Governments, Acting as the Kern Motorist Aid Authority, and the County of Kern for safety-related hazard and obstruction removal on state highways in Kern County in the amount of \$50,000. This item has been reviewed by County Counsel.

DISCUSSION

The County of Kern will use clients from the Bakersfield Homeless Center to carry out the contract for safety-related hazard and obstruction removal providing employment opportunities.

Attached for Board consideration is an Agreement between the County of Kern and the Kern COG Board, Acting as the Kern Motorist Aid Authority to contribute \$50,000 in motorist aid funds for safety-related hazard and obstruction removal from the state highways throughout Kern County.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN KERN COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS ACTING AS THE KERN MOTORIST AID AUTHORITY AND THE COUNTY OF KERN

THIS MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT ("Agreement"), made and entered into on 2023 ("Execution Date"), is by and between the County of Kern ("COUNTY") and Kern Council of Governments acting as the Kern Motorist Aid Authority, a joint powers entity ("KERN COG"). County and Kern COG are referred to individually as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties".

WITNESSETH

- A. KERN COG adopted the FY 2023-24 Overall Work Program and Financial Plan; and
- B. KERN COG acting as the Kern Motorist Aid Authority adopted a Financial Plan for operation and maintenance of a motorist aid system; and
- C. California Streets and Highways Code Section 2557(d) states that monies that exceed the amount needed for full implementation and ongoing costs to maintain and operate the motorist aid system, may be used for purposes of safety-related motorist aid projects; and
- D. Studies show that roadway hazards and obstructions, including litter and debris cause numerous accidents per year in North America; and
- E. The COUNTY has established a program for hazard and obstruction removal on state highways traversing the COUNTY; and
- F. KERN COG acting as the Kern Motorist Aid Authority is willing to provide funding to assist with hazard and obstruction removal on state highways traversing through the COUNTY excluding the Bakersfield City Limits.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. COUNTY shall be the lead agency for the operation of the hazard and obstruction removal program on state highways traversing through the COUNTY.
- 2. When the program is established, COUNTY shall submit a monthly invoice to KERN COG to be used for hazard and obstruction removal on state highways in Kern County. The first invoice shall be dated after the Execution Date of this Agreement, and the final invoice shall be dated before July 26, 2024.
- 3. KERN COG shall provide COUNTY up to fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) from funds programmed in the Kern Motorist Aid Financial Plan to pay for costs incurred by COUNTY in hazard and obstruction removal on state highways in Kern County.
- 4. COUNTY shall provide an oral report to the Kern COG Board on the amount of hazards and obstructions removed from state highways in Kern County.
- 5. The term of this Agreement shall be from the Execution Date through June 30, 2024.
- 6. Either Party may, at its sole discretion, terminate this Agreement at any time by giving 30 days written notice to the other Party.
- 7. Each Party shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless, the other party, and their respective officers, directors, employees, agents, members, shareholders, partners, joint

ventures, affiliates, successors, and assigns from and against any and all liabilities, obligations, claims, demands, suits, losses, expenses, damages, fines, judgments, settlements, and penalties, including, without limitation, costs, expenses, and attorneys' fees incident thereto, arising out of or based upon contract damages, property damage, or bodily injury (including death at any time resulting there from) to any person, including the indemnifying party's employees, affiliates, or agents, occasioned by or in connection with (1) the indemnifying party's negligent performance of (or failure to perform) the contract duties hereunder; (2) a violation of any laws or any negligent act or omission by the indemnifying party's or its affiliates, subcontractors, agents or employees during the performance of the contract duties hereunder; or (3) a breach of this Agreement by the indemnifying party or any of its affiliates, subcontractors, agents, or employees. The aforesaid obligation of indemnity shall be construed so as to extend to all legal, defense and investigation costs, as well as all other reasonable costs, expenses and liabilities incurred by the party indemnified (including reasonable attorneys fees), from and after the time at which the party indemnified received notification (whether verbal or written) that a claim or demand is to be made or may be made. Both parties' obligations under this Section do not extend to any liability caused by the sole negligence of the other party. This Section shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

- 8. No waiver of a breach of any provision of this Agreement shall constitute a waiver of any other breach, or of such provision. Failure of either Party to enforce at any time, or from time-to-time, any provision of this Agreement shall not be construed as a waiver thereof. The remedies herein reserved shall be cumulative and in addition to any other remedies in law or equity.
- 9. Should any part, term, portion, or provision of this Agreement be finally decided to be in conflict with any law of the United States or the State of California, or otherwise be unenforceable or ineffectual, the validity of the remaining parts, terms, portions, or provisions shall be deemed severable and shall not be affected thereby, provided such remaining portions or provisions can be construed in substance to constitute the agreement which the Parties intended to enter into in the first instance.
- 10. This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the Parties relating to the rights herein granted and the obligations herein assumed. Any oral representations or modifications concerning this Agreement shall be of no force or effect excepting a subsequent modification in writing, signed by the party to be charged.
- 11. The terms of this Agreement shall be construed and interpreted under, and all respective rights and duties shall be governed by, the laws of the State of California.
- 12. Any notice or notices required or permitted to be given pursuant to this Agreement may be personally served on the other Party by the Party giving such notice or may be served by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the following addresses:

- 13. The individual executing this Agreement on behalf of each Party warrants that he/she is authorized to execute the Agreement on behalf of their agency and that the agency will be bound by the terms and conditions contained herein.
- 14. COUNTY acknowledges that COUNTY, and all subcontractors hired by COUNTY to perform services under this Agreement, are aware of and understand the Immigration Reform and Control Act ("IRCA"). COUNTY is and shall remain in compliance with the IRCA and shall ensure that any subcontractors hired by COUNTY to perform services under this Agreement are in compliance with the IRCA.
- 15. COUNTY agrees to maintain and make available to KERN COG accurate books and records relative to all its activities under this Agreement. COUNTY shall permit KERN COG to audit, examine and make excerpts and transcripts from such records, and to conduct audits of all invoices, materials, and records of personnel or other data related to all other matters covered by this Agreement. COUNTY shall maintain such data and records in an accessible location and condition for a period of not less than three years from the date of final payment under this Agreement, or until after the conclusion of any audit, whichever occurs last. The State of California and/or any federal agency having an interest in the subject of this Agreement shall have the same rights conferred upon KERN COG herein.
- 16. COUNTY shall observe and comply with all applicable state, federal, and local laws, ordinances, rules and regulations now in effect or hereafter enacted, each of which are hereby made a part hereof and incorporated herein by reference.

Agreement for Safety-Related Hazard and Obstruction Removal on State

Highways

DESCRIPTION

Consideration of a Memorandum of Agreement between Kern Council of Governments, Acting as the Kern Motorist Aid Authority, and the City of Bakersfield for safety-related hazard and obstruction removal on state highways within the City of Bakersfield in the amount of \$225,000. This item has been reviewed by County Counsel.

DISCUSSION

The City of Bakersfield uses clients from the Bakersfield Homeless Center to carry out the contract for safety-related hazard and obstruction removal providing employment opportunities.

Attached for Board consideration is an Agreement between the City of Bakersfield and the Kern COG Board, Acting as the Kern Motorist Aid Authority to contribute \$225,000 in motorist aid funds for safety-related hazard and obstruction removal from the state highways within the City of Bakersfield.

ACTION

Approve the Memorandum of Agreement between Kern Council of Governments, Acting as the Kern Motorist Aid Authority, and the City of Bakersfield and authorize the Chair to execute the Agreement.

ROLL CALL VOTE.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN KERN COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS ACTING AS THE KERN MOTORIST AID AUTHORITY AND THE CITY OF BAKERSFIELD

THIS MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT ("**Agreement**"), made and entered into this ____ day of _____, 2023 ("**Execution Date**"), is by and between the City of Bakersfield, a charter city and municipal corporation, ("**CITY**") and Kern Council of Governments acting as the Kern Motorist Aid Authority, a joint powers entity ("**KERN COG**"). City and Kern COG are referred to individually as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties".

WITNESSETH

- A. KERN COG adopted the FY 2023-24 Overall Work Program and Financial Plan; and
- B. KERN COG acting as the Kern Motorist Aid Authority adopted a Financial Plan for operation and maintenance of a motorist aid system; and
- C. California Streets and Highways Code Section 2557(d) states that monies that exceed the amount needed for full implementation and ongoing costs to maintain and operate the motorist aid system, may be used for purposes of safety-related motorist aid projects; and
- D. Studies show that roadway hazards and obstructions, including litter and debris cause numerous accidents per year in North America; and
- E. The CITY has established a program for hazard and obstruction removal on state highways traversing the CITY; and
- F. KERN COG acting as the Kern Motorist Aid Authority is willing to provide funding to assist with hazard and obstruction removal on state highways traversing through the CITY.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. CITY shall be the lead agency for the operation of the hazard and obstruction removal program on state highways traversing through the CITY.
- 2. CITY, beginning July 1, 2023, shall submit a monthly invoice to KERN COG for funds to be used for hazard and obstruction removal on state highways in Kern County. The first invoice shall be dated after the Execution Date of this Agreement, and the final invoice shall be dated before July 26, 2024.
- 3. KERN COG shall provide CITY up to two hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$225,000) from funds programmed in the Kern Motorist Aid Financial Plan to pay for costs incurred by CITY in hazard and obstruction removal on state highways traversing the CITY.
- 4. CITY shall provide a written monthly report to Kern COG on the amount of hazards and obstructions removed from state highways traversing the CITY.
- 5. The term of this Agreement shall be from the Execution Date through June 30, 2024.
- 6. Either Party may, at its sole discretion, terminate this Agreement at any time by giving 30 days written notice to the other Party.
- 7. CITY shall indemnify, defend (upon written request of KERN COG) and save harmless KERN COG, its officers, agents and employees from any and all losses, damages, liability, claims or causes of action of every nature whatsoever for physical damage to or destruction

of property, including the property of KERN COG, or physical injury to or death of any person or persons, including KERN COG's officers, agents and employees, which may arise out of any act or omission of the CITY, its officers, agents, independent contractors or employees during the performance of this Agreement.

- 8. No waiver of a breach of any provision of this Agreement shall constitute a waiver of any other breach, or of such provision. Failure of either Party to enforce at any time, or from time-to-time, any provision of this Agreement shall not be construed as a waiver thereof. The remedies herein reserved shall be cumulative and in addition to any other remedies in law or equity.
- 9. Should any part, term, portion, or provision of this Agreement be finally decided to be in conflict with any law of the United States or the State of California, or otherwise be unenforceable or ineffectual, the validity of the remaining parts, terms, portions, or provisions shall be deemed severable and shall not be affected thereby, provided such remaining portions or provisions can be construed in substance to constitute the agreement which the Parties intended to enter into in the first instance.
- 10. This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the Parties relating to the rights herein granted and the obligations herein assumed. Any oral representations or modifications concerning this Agreement shall be of no force or effect excepting a subsequent modification in writing, signed by the party to be charged.
- 11. The terms of this Agreement shall be construed and interpreted under, and all respective rights and duties shall be governed by, the laws of the State of California.
- 12. Any notice or notices required or permitted to be given pursuant to this Agreement may be personally served on the other Party by the Party giving such notice or may be served by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the following addresses:

- 13. The individual executing this Agreement on behalf of each Party warrants that he/she is authorized to execute the Agreement on behalf of their agency and that the agency will be bound by the terms and conditions contained herein.
- 14. CITY acknowledges that CITY, and all subcontractors hired by CITY to perform services under this Agreement, are aware of and understand the Immigration Reform and Control Act ("IRCA"). CITY is and shall remain in compliance with the IRCA and shall ensure that any subcontractors hired by CITY to perform services under this Agreement are in compliance with the IRCA. In addition, CITY agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless KERN COG, its agents, officers and employees, from any liability, damages or causes of action arising out of or relating to any claims that CITY's employees, or the employees of any subcontractor hired by CITY, are not authorized to work in the United States for CITY or its subcontractor and/or any other claims based upon alleged IRCA violations committed by CITY or CITY's subcontractor(s).

- 15. CITY agrees to maintain and make available to KERN COG accurate books and records relative to all its activities under this Agreement. CITY shall permit KERN COG to audit, examine and make excerpts and transcripts from such records, and to conduct audits of all invoices, materials, and records of personnel or other data related to all other matters covered by this Agreement. CITY shall maintain such data and records in an accessible location and condition for a period of not less than three years from the date of final payment under this Agreement, or until after the conclusion of any audit, whichever occurs last. The State of California and/or any federal agency having an interest in the subject of this Agreement shall have the same rights conferred upon KERN COG herein.
- 16. CITY shall observe and comply with all applicable state, federal, and local laws, ordinances, rules and regulations now in effect or hereafter enacted, each of which are hereby made a part hereof and incorporated herein by reference.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Parties have caused this MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT to be executed by their respective officers and agents thereunto duly authorized as of the Execution Date.

2023 Update - Kern Council of Governments Public Involvement Procedures & Policies

DESCRIPTION:

The 2017 California Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) Guidelines require that a Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) develop a public participation plan prior to the development of the RTP. The Regional Planning Advisory Committee has reviewed this item.

DISCUSSION:

The Public Involvement Procedures and Policies (PIP) provide guidance for Kern Council of Governments' (Kern COG) elected officials and staff in public participation and interagency consultation throughout the regional planning process. It contains the agency policies, guidelines and procedures Kern COG uses in developing the metropolitan planning process. This includes the development and approval of the Regional Transportation Plan, Regional and Federal Transportation Improvement Program, and environmental review documentation related to growth, transportation, air quality, and any product prepared by Kern COG staff that statutorily requires public participation, or for which the Kern COG Board of Directors determines is necessary. Kern COG carries out its transportation and air quality planning responsibilities in a continuing, cooperative and comprehensive manner in conformance with Federal and State law that determine how Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) provide for early consultation and public participation.

Prior to development of the 2026 RTP, Kern COG is updating the Public Involvement Policies and Procedures (PIP) to include the latest Federal and State requirements and input from participating agencies and stakeholders. The Draft 2023 PIP is posted at https://www.kerncog.org/policies/

The 2017 California RTP Guidelines as well as Kern COG's 2019 PIP require a forty-five (45) day public comment period prior to adoption of the 2023 PIP. The 45-day public comment period began May 1st, 2023, and closes June 15th, 2023.

Additional roundtable meetings will be held in Fall of 2023 to gather input for specific strategies for public participation during the 2026 RTP development outreach in accordance with the 2023 PIP.

FINAL KERN COG FY 2023-2024 FINANCIAL PLAN

<u>DESCRIPTION</u>: Pursuant to policy, Kern Council of Governments (Kern COG) prepares and adopts an annual financial plan (budget) detailing estimated revenues and expenditures for the ensuing fiscal year. Staff has prepared a <u>final</u> Kern COG FY 2023-2024 Financial Plan that includes \$6,147,134 in estimated operating revenues and \$6,360,882 in estimated operating and capital expenditures.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: Attached is the <u>final</u> Kern COG FY 2023-2024 Financial Plan. This final plan serves as the presentation of detailed information regarding FY 2023-2024 budget issues and appropriations leading to the conduct of a public hearing and Council consideration for adoption. The **final** plan contains the following general provisions:

REVENUES -- Estimated total operating revenues of \$6,147,134 representing a 25.3 percent decrease from the prior year budget. This includes carryover fund estimates, which will be further amended into the budget when confirmed after the first quarter of the fiscal year.

EXPENDITURES -- Appropriations totaling \$6,360,882 to fund current operating expenditures, including all projects set forth in the Overall Work Program. This represents a 24.1 percent decrease in operating appropriations from the prior year budget.

Please see the attached document for a more detailed presentation of FY 2023-2024 budget related issues and appropriations.

Staff recommends approval.

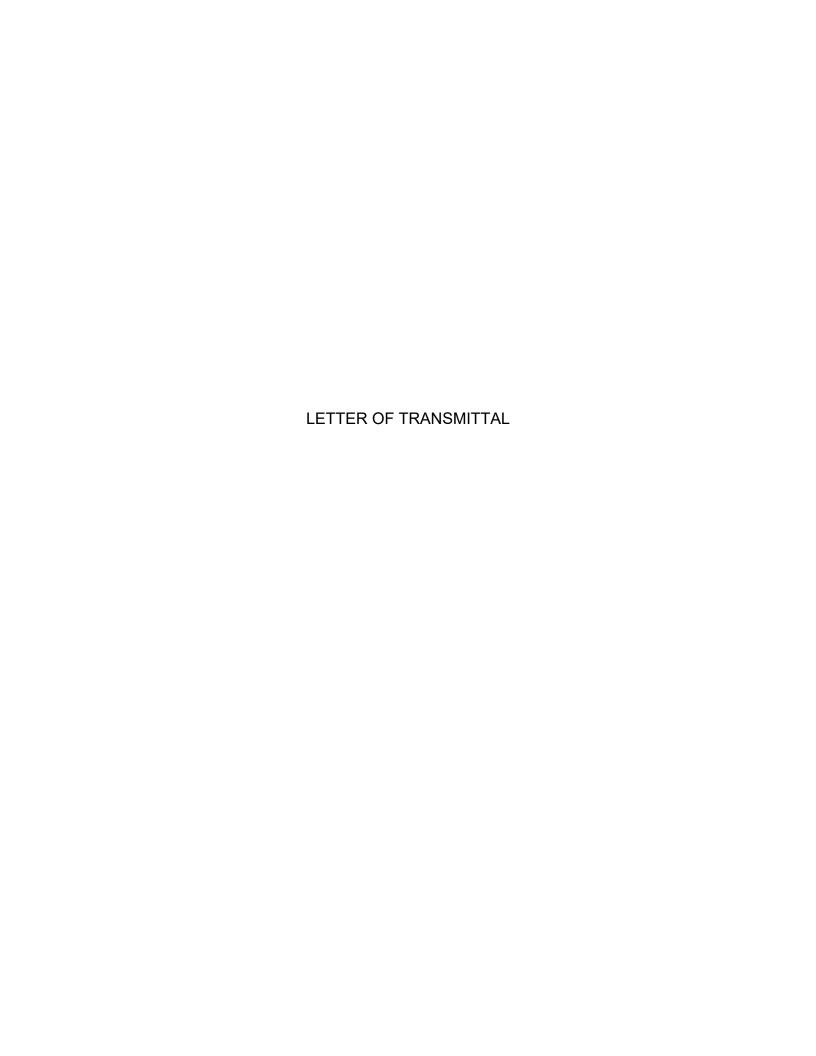

Dear Chairman and Board:

Kern Council of Governments (Kern COG) staff is pleased to submit for your review and approval the final Kern COG Annual Financial Plan for fiscal year 2023-2024. This plan is an estimate of the financial activity anticipated for the fiscal year stated in object, account and line item format. The plan provides sufficient appropriations to fund all programs and projects documented in the FY 2023-2024 Overall Work Program. In summary, the final plan includes revenues of \$6,147,134 and expenditures of \$6,360,882.

REVENUES

Kern COG staff anticipates FY 2023-2024 budgeted revenues totaling \$6,147,134. Total budgeted revenues are estimated to decrease by 25.3 percent from the prior year budget.

Federal revenues decrease marginally, and Kern COG continues to maximize these funds, while the use of toll credits as local match allows for the use the local funding sources in other areas. State revenue, including those from the Road Repair and Accountability Act have also dropped and are included in the financial plan. When additional carryover amounts are certified in the second quarter, Kern COG will amend the budget.

EXPENDITURES

Kern COG staff proposes FY 2023-2024 expenditure appropriations totaling \$6,360,882. This represents an decrease of 24.1 percent over the prior year budget. In terms of the four basic object classes, these appropriations are distributed as follows:

With respect to personnel related appropriations, Kern COG's staffing level is recommended to stay at 18 full-time and 2 part-time positions. With respect to professional service related appropriations, staff recommends a slight increase. For further details regarding subcontractors, please refer to the discussion under "Programs", which follows. With respect to appropriations for services and supplies and capital, staff recommends those classes increase for the 2023-2024 fiscal year.

PROGRAMS

In addition to ongoing planning activities such as air quality conformity and public transit funding, staff recommends a variety of expanded program initiatives for the 2023-2024 fiscal year. These initiatives include the following:

- 1) Regional Housing Need Allocation Plan/Regional Early Action Planning Grant Program: to estimate and allocate regional housing needs in Kern County
- 2) Sustainable Communities: for local and regional multimodal transportation and land use planning projects that support regional sustainable community strategies.
- 3) Regional Technical Assistance: to provide technical assistance to member agencies to address regional and subregional issues related to transportation planning.

CONCLUSION

The proposed Kern COG Annual Financial Plan for the 2023-2024 fiscal year continues to provide for the achievement of two major underlying objectives. First, the plan fulfills the Council and staff obligation to maintain the region's federal and state certifications. And, thereby, ensures the continued flow of resources to Kern COG member agencies. And second, the plan provides for extensive direct services to Kern COG member agencies in support of local efforts to serve the citizens of the Kern region. Staff recommends your Council's favorable consideration.

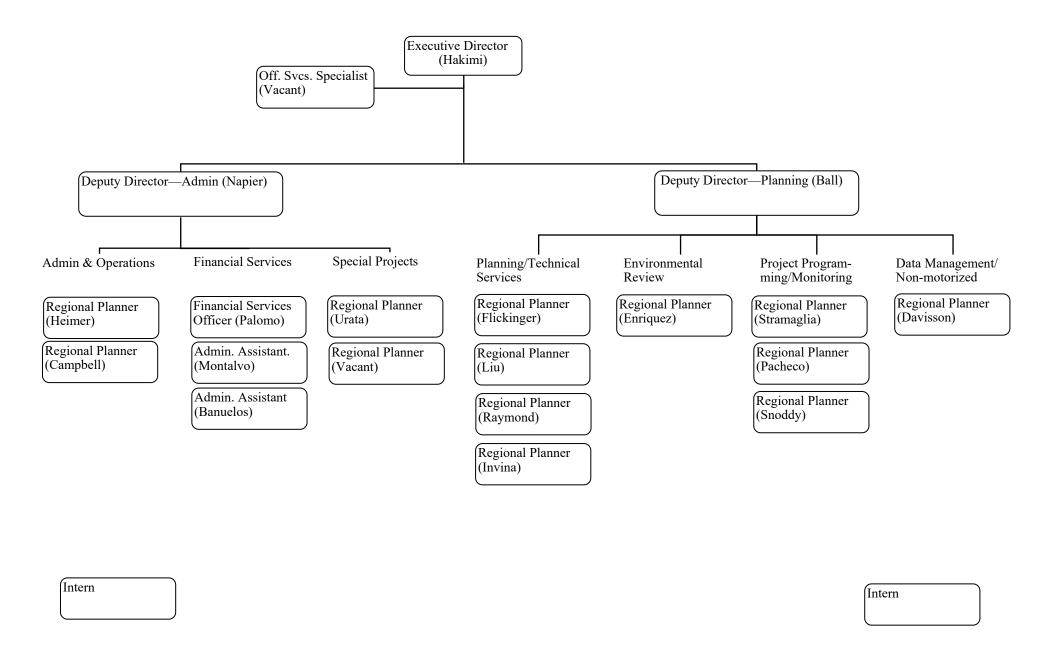

Kern Council of Governments Population





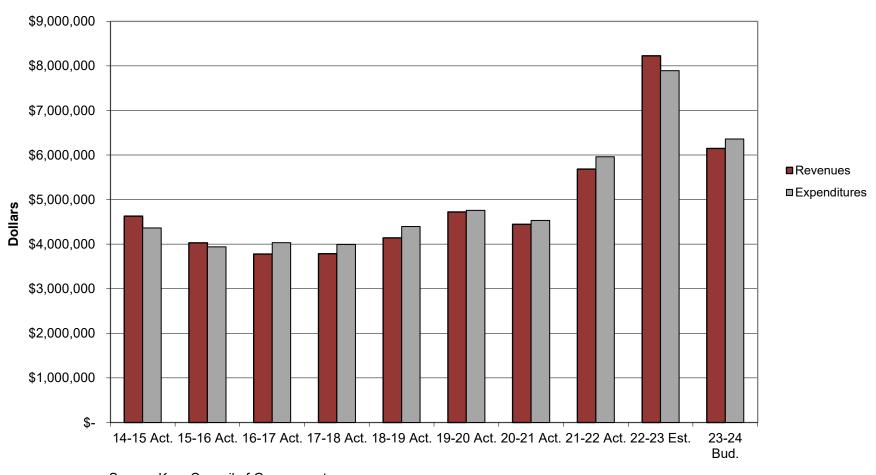

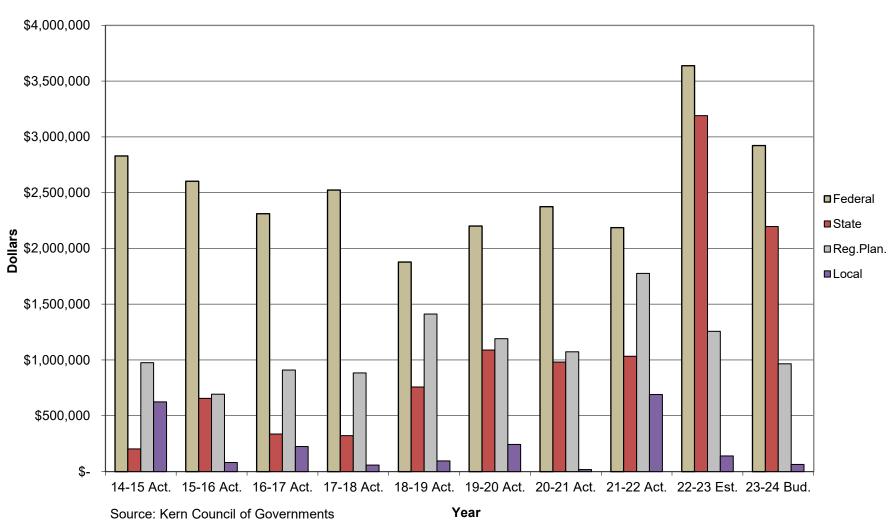

Dear Chairman and Board:

Kern Motorist Aid Authority (KMAA) staff is pleased to submit the Fiscal Year 2023-2024 Annual Financial Plan for your review and approval. The plan is a statement, by object or account classification and line item within each account, of the anticipated KMAA financial activity for the upcoming year. The plan includes estimated revenues totaling \$835,711 and estimated expenses totaling \$641,788.

REVENUES

The KMAA, acting in its capacity as a service authority for freeway emergencies is financed by the assessment of a \$1.00 fee upon each registered nonexempt motor vehicle within the County of Kern. The California Department of Motor Vehicles applies the fee as part of the vehicle registration program and returns the amount collected, less a processing fee, within the county. Over the past few years, fees collected have been relatively stable. Staff anticipates vehicle fees totaling \$807,157 for the 2023-2024 fiscal year; a 2.1 percent increase over the prior year budget.

In addition to fees, KMAA realizes non-operating revenues (interest) by investing cash balances through the Kern County Treasurers' cash investment program. Staff anticipates interest revenue totaling \$28,555 for the 2023-2024 fiscal year.

EXPENSES

KMAA budgetary appropriations are primarily focused on these areas: 511 traveler information, litter removal, depreciation and capital. Expenses have leveled off following the removal of the call box system a few years ago. Staff estimates total appropriations of \$641,788 will be required to finance FY 2023-2024 operations.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Sections 2550-2559 of the Streets and Highways Code, relating to highways authorizes the use of KMAA moneys for traveler information systems, Intelligent Transportation System architecture and infrastructure, and other transportation demand management services, and safety-related hazard and obstruction removal.

KMAA program services are delivered through an extensive public-private partnership.

CONCLUSION

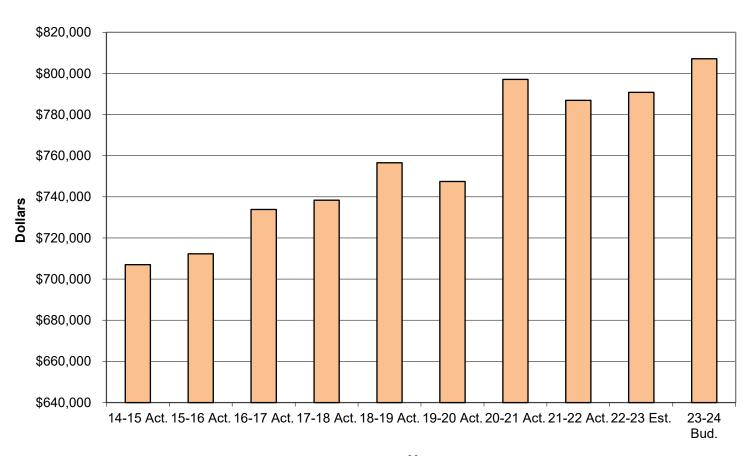

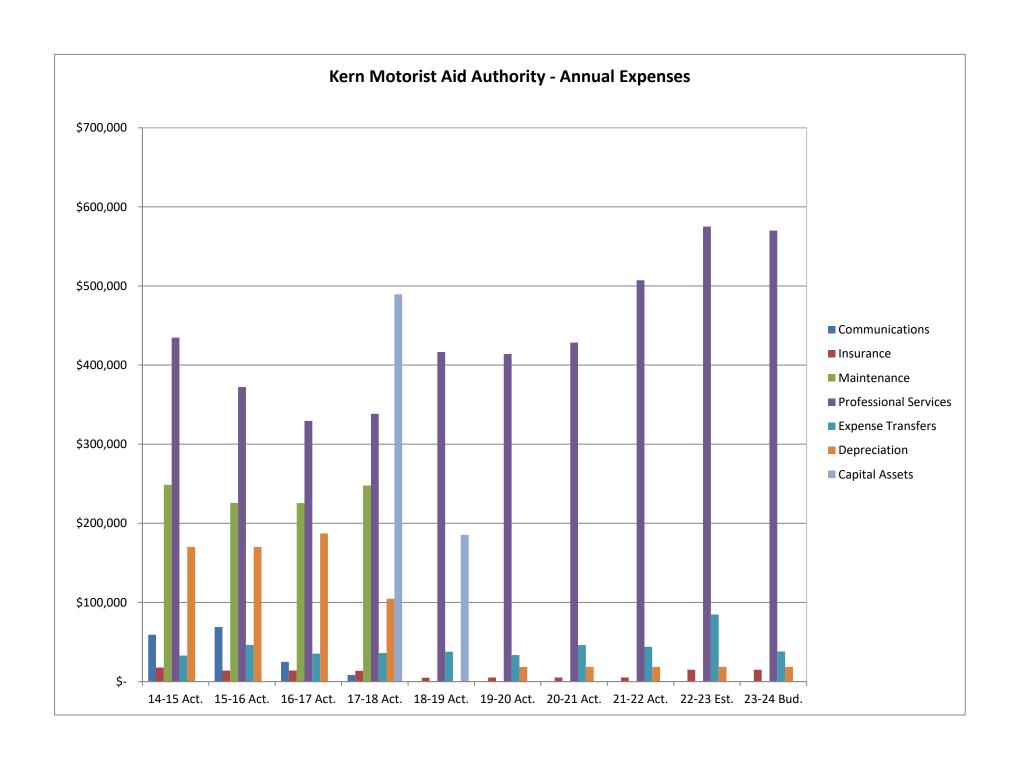
Kern Motorist Aid Authority DMV Revenue History
