Project Updates:

- Freeman 3 CAPM
 - On State Route 14 south of SR 178 and north of Red Rock Canyon SP
 - Crews have finished the partial depth recycle of the asphalt
 - Crews will begin laying Rubberized HMA on Monday, June 12
- Emergency Kern Slab Replacement
 - On multiple locations of SR 58 in and around Tehachapi. The outside EB and WB lanes are closed.
 - Crews continue to repair slabs and fill in dig outs on the roadway
 - The Mill Street ramps have reopened.
 - Work anticipated to finish within the next two weeks.

Kern Bridge Repair There is maintenance/repair work on three bridges near Tehachapi and Mojave on SR 58

- On the Sand Canyon Road undercrossing
- On the overhead railroad crossing east of Exit 167
- In the drain just west of Exit 149
- Work is scheduled during the day and overnight.
- 58 Truck Climbing Lanes D9 spoke with Ahron and the City of Tehachapi about merging the scope of the 58 TCL into the Keene project this week. Project is now completely funded through the SHOPP.
- HWY 58 Boron SRRA Sewage System Repair Four new pumps were ordered. Lead time 12 to 16 weeks. Quoted delivery – 10, July to 14, Aug
- Other: District 9 supports Kern COG in its desire to realign Cal City Blvd. by building an off-system frontage road to tie into the Rosemond Blvd. interchange at SR 58. Although this is primarily a locally-sponsored off-system project, there is a tie-in to the State Highway System, so we are exploring ways that we might be able to assist or even partner with Kern COG, We are currently investigating a possible opportunity that might be provided by our Headquarters Division of Transportation Planning to use a resource augmentation in order to develop an updated Project Initiation Document, or PID, for the existing 'Mojave to Boron Freeway" project in order to explicitly include Kern Cog's proposed improvement concept. We have nominated this PID to HQ and will keep Mr. Hakimi apprised of our progress in this regard moving forward.

- \$1.18 Billion Federal Funding Available with Safe Streets and Roads for All Grant Program! -The purpose of this grant is to improve roadway safety by significantly reducing or eliminating roadway fatalities and serious injuries through safety action plan development and refinement and implementation focused on all users, including pedestrians, bicyclists, public transportation users, motorists, personal conveyance and micro-mobility users, and commercial vehicle operators. Applications are due Monday, July 10, 2023.

KERN COG SENATE BILL NO. 1 – CALTRANS STATE OF GOOD REPAIR

CALL FOR PROJECTS

DESCRIPTION:

Caltrans State of Good Repair (SGR) Transit Program allocates annual funds from Senate Bill No. 1 legislation to the Kern region. The Transportation Technical Advisory Committee has reviewed this item.

DISCUSSION:

The Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017, Senate Bill (SB) 1 (Chapter 5, Statutes of 2017), signed by the governor on April 28, 2017, includes a program that will provide additional revenues for transit infrastructure repair and service improvements. This investment in public transit will be referred to as the State of Good Repair (SGR) Program. This program receives funding of approximately \$125 million annually. SGR funds are to be made available for eligible transit maintenance, rehabilitation, and capital projects.

SB1 emphasizes the importance of accountability and transparency in the delivery of California's transportation programs. Therefore, to be eligible for SGR funding, potential agencies must comply with various reporting requirements. The SGR Guidelines will describe the general policies and procedures in carrying out the reporting requirements and other statutory objectives of the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017.

Kern COG staff has prepared the fiscal year 2023-24 SGR Transit Program of Projects (POP) totaling \$1,547,558 (See attachment "A").

PROGRAM OF PROJECTS

DESCRIPTION:

Kern Council of Governments, acting in the capacity as the state-designated Regional Transportation Planning Agency, administers funding for the Transportation Development Act Article 3 Program. The Transportation Technical Advisory Committee has reviewed this item.

DISCUSSION:

Article 3 funds are used to pay for bicycle and pedestrian safety programs, bicycle parking facilities, and bicycle and pedestrian travel facilities. **Approximately \$1,076,480** is available for distribution in this funding cycle.

Standardized criteria are used to evaluate project prioritization. Bicycle parking and bicycle and pedestrian safety programs have the highest priority, with the remaining funding split 70%-30% between bicycle and pedestrian travel facilities. No more than forty (40) percent of the available annual funding allocation (\$1,076,480) shall be approved to a single claimant. Kern COG staff have reviewed the applications, verified project scoring and prepared the fiscal year 2023-24 TDA Article 3 program of projects (See Attachment "A").

Action: Approve the fiscal year 2023-24 Transportation Development Act Article 3 Program of Projects. ROLL CALL VOTE.

WHEREAS, the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), adopted by Kern COG, has established goals, objectives, and policies for the implementation of transportation systems in Kern County; and

WHEREAS, a triennial performance audit and annual financial/compliance audit of claimant's operations have been completed; and

WHEREAS, claimant's claim, submitted and on file as part of the official Kern COG records, is made a part of this resolution by this reference.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. This allocation is made for the fiscal year 2023-24 to the claimant listed above and in accordance with Schedule A, attached hereto and made a part of this resolution by this reference; and
- 2. Kern COG hereby makes the following findings:
 - a) Claimant's proposed transit services are responding to transit needs currently not being met in the area of apportionment; and
 - b) Claimant's proposed transit services shall, if appropriate, be integrated with existing transit services; and
 - c) Claimant's proposed budget, as itemized in the claim, designate revenues and expenses conforming with the RTP; and
 - d) The ratio of fare revenue to operating costs is sufficient to enable claimant to meet the requirements of California Public Utilities Code Sections 99268.2, 99268.3, 99268.4, 99268.5, 99268.6, 99268.7, 99268.9, 99268.11, 99268.12, 99268.26, 99268.17, and 99268.19, as applicable; and
 - e) Claimant has made full use of federal funds available under the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964, as amended; and
 - f) The sum of claimant's allocation from the Local Transportation Fund and State Transit Assistance Fund does not exceed the amount eligible to be received during the fiscal year. Claimant may, however, be required to repay excess funds, pursuant to Title 21 California Code of Regulations Section 6735; and

- g) Kern COG has considered claims to offset unanticipated increases in fuel costs, to enhance existing transit services, to meet high priority regional sub-regional transit needs; and
- h) Claimant has made reasonable efforts to implement the productivity improvements developed pursuant to PUC section 99244; and
- i) Claimant is not precluded by contract from employing part-time drivers or from contracting with common carriers operating under franchise or license; and
- j) Claimant has received certification by the California Highway Patrol within the last thirteen months indicating that the operations are in compliance with California Vehicle Code Section 1808.1.
- 3. Claimant is allocated Local Transportation Fund and State Transit Assistance fund monies in amounts not to exceed that listed on Schedule A, attached hereto and made a part of this resolution by this reference; and
- 4. Disbursement of transit monies, allocated for the regional planning process, shall be made from claimant's Local Transportation Fund reserve accounts to the Kern COG planning account as the first priority payment; and

1) Size and location of identifiable groups likely to be dependent upon transit, including but not necessarily limited to, the elderly, the handicapped and the poor; 2) Adequacy of existing public transportation services; and 3) Potential alternative public transportation and specialized transportation services, and service improvement that would meet travel demand; and

WHEREAS, Kern COG is further required to hold a public hearing to receive testimony identifying or commenting on unmet transit needs within the jurisdiction of claimants that might be reasonable to meet by establishing or contracting for new public transportation or specialized transportation services or expanding existing services (Section 99238.5, PUC); and

WHEREAS, The Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), adopted by Kern COG, established goals, objectives, and policies for the implementation of public transportation systems in Kern County, and public testimony received at public hearings, evidence Kern COG's efforts to identify transportation needs pursuant to Section 99238.5, PUC; and

WHEREAS, The RTP, adopted by Kern COG, established goals, objectives, and policies for the implementation of public transportation systems in Kern County; and

WHEREAS, Claimant has filed a claim for street and road funds pursuant to Public Utilities Code Article 8 Section 99400(a); and

WHEREAS, Kern COG, in accordance with the relevant provisions of the TDA and its own rules and regulations, has received and evaluated Claimant's Article 8 street and road claim consistent with the provisions of Section 99400(a), Article 8 of the PUC, and Section 99313.3, Article 6.5 of the PUC; and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to Section 99238.5, PUC, Kern COG has held a public hearing to receive testimony identifying and commenting on unmet transit needs within the jurisdiction of claimant; and

WHEREAS, the proposed projects are consistent with claimant's projected TDA revenues and the Regional Transportation Plan; and

WHEREAS, Claimant proposes to use the funds for projects shown on the claim submitted by claimant and filed in the Kern COG office.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

Code Section 6633.2-6633.9); and b) this claim on the Local Transportation Fund (LTF) for Article 8 is consistent with the RTP.

 - a) Claimant is herein allocated the LTF and STAF funds available for apportionment shown on Attachment "A," plus any interest and balance from prior years, for use on projects also shown on Attachment "A"); b) Before any streets and roads payments are made to claimant under Articles 8 or 6.5, those allocations approved by this Council for transit, Articles 4 and 6.5, shall be credited to claimant's transit reserve account in trust fund #24075, Article 8, and #24076, Article 6.5; and c) Remaining Article 8 and 6.5 funds shall be credited to and retained in claimant's non-transit streets and roads reserve account in trust fund #24075 and #24076 and shall be transferred or disbursed to claimant in accordance with Attachment "A" of this resolution and written instructions for disbursement issued by Kern COG staff.
- 3. The Chairman and Executive Director of Kern COG are hereby authorized to perform any and all acts necessary to accomplish the purpose of this resolution, including the submission of allocation instructions to the Kern County Auditor-Controller pursuant to 21 California Administrative Code, Section 6659.

DESCRIPTION:

The 2022 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP)/Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) includes a strategy to provide sub regional feedback on SB 375 travel reduction goals and provide technical assistance and grant writing assistance to help sub areas of the County that need it most. This is an annual process reviewed by the TTAC and RPAC.

DISCUSSION:

A new 2-part strategy was proposed in the 2014 RTP/SCS, and continued in subsequent cycles, to help our member agencies voluntarily monitor their progress toward the region's air emission goals. The strategy also helps member agencies develop projects that will better compete for funding under policies that emphasizes sustainability. Kern COG provides monitoring data along with technical assistance and grant writing assistance. The data provides sub-regional monitoring feedback and helps prioritize assistance using the regional travel model as part of this process.

COG Technical Assistance

The 2014 RTP was the first to contain an SCS as required by the state Climate Protection Act of 2008 (SB 375). Kern COG began work with member agencies on developing more sustainable projects and strategies immediately after the adoption of the 2008 Kern Regional Blueprint.

Since 2009, Kern COG has awarded over \$500,000 in technical assistance grants and/or staff time support to provide member agencies with resources to identify and implement projects that would further the goals of the 2008 Kern Regional Blueprint and now the SCS. Available funding for Kern COG technical assistance grants, and staff time support to assist member agencies in applying for the numerous grant resources varies from year to year based on need and resource availability. This program has helped fund:

- In kind staff-time match for sustainable community planning grants for modeling/public outreach
- Regional travel demand modeling and GIS mapping support
- community bike and complete street plans
- community visioning/design workshops
- 2D/3D community visualizations

- transportation impact fee programs
- general plan circulation element updates
- Early transportation project development planning studies

Member Agencies Email Sustainable Community Planning/Project Development Ideas to Kern COG by Friday, September 29, 2023 - Under this Kern COG local government assistance program, staff can recommend that technical assistance resources be prioritized for agencies with the greatest potential need (see monitoring section below). Agencies must request technical assistance in writing by September 29, 2023 for consideration. Requests may be made by email and should include a brief preliminary scope and budget regarding the planning level work needed. Agencies are encouraged to contact COG staff for assistance in developing the request for sustainable community strategy implementation and planning funds. Staff will provide assistance to member agencies in deciding which grant resources (see attachment 1) are most appropriate and effective. Member Agencies Provided with Free Access to GrantFinder.com - Kern COG has secured GrantFinder software licenses on behalf of its member agencies, and local public transit agencies for the period ending March 30, 2024, which may be extended. GrantFinder (http://grantfinder.com) is a real-time database of federal, state, and private grant opportunities tailored to municipalities and nonprofits. The program allows users to tailor their grant searches to their needs. To receive access, the member agency may designate up to two users on the attached form and return it to Linda Urata, Regional Planner. Currently all member agencies have access except for the cities of Shafter and Tehachapi. GrantFinder training is available by request; Program contact: Linda at 661-635-2904 or lurata@kerncog.org or Susanne Campbell scampbell@kerncog.org.

Prioritized Funding Policy for More Sustainable Projects - In November 2012 and most recently updated in April 2021, the Kern COG Board adopted the new project delivery policies and procedure (https://www.kerncog.org/policies/) to assist the region in promoting projects that better match the goals of the RTP/SCS. Dependent on the funding category, the procedure provides points for ranking projects for future funding. Up to half of the points go to projects that promote more sustainable/livable communities and lower air emissions. Since this policy and procedure update, Kern COG has funded park & ride facilities in California City and South Bakersfield, the Golden Empire Transit District has implemented a new/more convenient bus rapid transit, express bus and On Demand microtransit network, and the City of Tehachapi has adopted the first city-wide "form-based-code" General Plan in California. These types of projects are proliferating in the region in part because of the Kern COG adopted project delivery policies.

Monitoring Data Feedback

The table in Attachment 2 shows the latest modeling of auto Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) per person (household population + employment by place of work) from the most recently adopted RTP. The total shows a 2.6 percent decrease in VMT between 2020 and 2022. All regions show lower VMT per capita household population + employment by 2046 compared to 2020 except for Greater Taft, Arvin and Tehachapi.

This technical and grant writing assistance program RTP strategy will continue to be funded as planning funds and grants are available. Subject to the Board's direction, Kern COG resources may be prioritized to communities that may be showing difficulty in making progress towards reducing emissions and passenger vehicle travel. Grants and incentives are subject to state and federal funding requirements.





Note that this reporting is voluntary and for advisory purposes only. Future year values are estimated based on the latest land use assumptions and are updated every four years. These assumptions can vary widely from year to year based on recent changes in the local development activity and other variables. Although average travel per person includes areas outside each sub area (see spider diagram maps below), they do not include travel outside the county, possibly skewing the results of sub areas nearer the edge of the County. The analysis shows that Bakersfield and Ridgecrest have the lowest travel per person possibly because these regions are fairly self-contained having sufficient amenities such as hospitals. The 2022 RTP/SCS is the first to be accepted in the San Joaquin Valley by the California Aire Resources Board and demonstrates that Kern is on track to make state GHG targets for passenger vehicle travel if fully implemented.


Attachment 3 – Map of Sub Areas


Transportation Analysis Zones (TAZs) by Regional Statistical Areas (RSAs)







UPDATE: SB 375 GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSION REDUCTION FROM PASSENGER VEHICLES AND ADOPTION TIMELINE FOR THE 2026 RTP

DESCRIPTION:

The Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) is required to be updated every 4-years and contains a long range 24-year transportation expenditure portfolio fulfilling numerous policies and regulations including but not limited to public involvement, social equity, air quality conformity, congestion management, and Senate Bill (SB) 375 per capita greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction targets. This item was shared with the Regional Planning Advisory Committee.

DISCUSSION:

This discussion provides an update on the activity related to the RTP and the SB 375 Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS). The report is updated regularly with the most recent developments listed first.

July 26, 2023 – 2026 RTP/SCS Roundtable Meeting was held for environmental, equity, business & industry groups on the public outreach process at Kern COG and included 14 representatives from the Delores Huerta Foundation, Central California Asthma Collaborative, Sierra Club, Home Builders Association, Golden Empire Transit, Caltrans, County Public Works, and staff from the cities of McFarland, Taft, and Wasco.

July 13, 2023 - California Air Resources Board (ARB) staff emailed Kern COG and the California, the final acceptance letter is still working its way through upper management reviews and may not be issued till September due to staffing and vacation issues.

June 15, 2023 – Kern COG Board approved the 2023 Public Involvement Procedures document after a 45-day public review. The document is online at https://www.kerncog.org/policies/.

June 13, 2023 – ARB staff emailed Kern COG and the California Transportation Commission that "the SCS is officially approved." However, the final acceptance letter is still working its way through upper management reviews and will take several weeks before it is issued.

May 19, 2023 – ARB staff acknowledged receipt of the requested transmittal letter signed by the Kern COG Chair, and associated TPPC staff report. ARB staff indicated they would provide a status update by May 31, and try to meet Kern COG's request for an expedited review by June 8, but that they could not commit to any date earlier than June 27.

May 5, 2023 - Kern COG submitted a draft of a Kern COG TPPC staff report and transmittal letter to ARB with a request for the Kern COG Chair to sign. The item was approved by the Board on May 18, 2023 and signed by the Chair. The letter documents technical changes that do not affect the adopted RTP/SCS text or conclusions. The document contains updates from the November 2022 SCS technical data submittal to ARB consistent with ARB guidelines.

May 1, 2023 – Kern COG circulated the draft Public Involvement Procedure for 45-day public review period to be concluded on June 15. In addition, the Kern COG Executive Director and other COG directors from the San Joaquin Valley met with the SJV representative on the California Air Resources Board. At that meeting ARB staff indicated that Kern was close to receiving the acceptance finding for their SCS.

April 26, 2023 – Kern COG submitted to ARB a cover letter and revised technical methodology data submittal with all the requested updates since the November data submittal. ARB requested that the Kern COG's chair's signature be approved by the Kern COG Board,

April 17, 2023 – Kern COG web conferenced with ARB staff for the 14th time in 3 years to discuss the 2022 SCS technical methodology. One final methodology issue remains out of 27 identified in CARB's January 20th memorandum. Additional adjustments were made to the elasticity used to adjust the hybrid NCST tool method used by Fresno COG. Documentation of the adjustment was submitted to ARB on April 18, 2023. ARB is required to provide their finding and recommendations 2 months after the submitted package from November 29, 2023 is found to be complete.

March 29, April 7, April 14, 2023 – Kern COG web conferenced with ARB to further refine SCS modeling methodology.

February 17, 2023 – Kern COG submitted responses to the California Air Resources Board (ARB) January 20, 2023 questions on Kern COG's technical methodology package provided to ARB on November 29, 2023.

January 20, 2023 – ARB responded to Kern COGs SCS technical methodology submittal from November 29, 2022 with questions. A follow-up meeting was held on January 24, 2023 to further clarify the questions.

December 16, 2022 – The 2022 RTP/Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP) short range transportation program air quality conformity was federally approved. The 2023 FTIP "CTIPS Report" and "Grouped Project Listing" weblinks are available at: https://www.kerncog.org/2023-ftip/.

November 29, 2022 – Kern COG submitted the technical methodology data package to the ARB.

July 21, 2022 - the Kern COG Board adopted the 2022 RTP/SCS and associated documents. The documents are available on the Kern COG website at https://www.kerncog.org/category/docs/rtp/.

PROJECT ACCOUNTABILITY TEAM REPORT

DESCRIPTION:

Kern COG staff to provide the latest updates. The Transportation Technical Advisory Committee has reviewed this item.

DISCUSSION:

The Project Accountability Team meetings are held quarterly as needed to discuss project implementation issues and to develop solutions. Participants review project status information for projects in the Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP). Since no meeting has been held recently, this report is meant to provide the latest updates.

- 1. Transportation Development Act (TDA) Article 3 invoices should be submitted to Bob Snoddy at bsnoddy@kerncog.org. Please see project list attached.
- 2. Caltrans' monthly Local Assistance Delivery report includes funding authorizations (obligations) and de-obligations for formula federal funds. As of the June 2023 report, the Kern region had the highest delivery rate in the state for Congestion Mitigation Air Quality Program and Regional Surface Transportation Program delivery 149.7%.
- 3. Score Card 81% of projects have approved funding authorization; 19% was not submitted for funding authorization (two Active Transportation Program projects totaling \$6,373,000 requested CTC time extensions).
- 4. The FY 23/24 Active Transportation Program (ATP), Congestion Mitigation Air Quality Program (CMAQ), Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) project list is provided to remind agencies to deliver early.

The OA spread between regions and programs was updated based on the Department's Division of Financial Programming FFY 2023 Estimated apportionment distributions issued on November 10, 2022. The estimated OA amounts may be updated in the future if there is a change to the local OA share.
- ² Balance of FFY 2022 OA (last FFY's OA balance) -- This is the amount a Region/Program must pay back if over delivered or the amount a Region/Program will receive to "make whole" if under delivered based on the Division of Local Assistance's (DLA's) OA Management Policy. Amounts shown in parenthesis are amounts owed and positive (non-parenthesis numbers) amounts are to be repaid to Regions/Programs. - In May 2023, \$42,531,243 of Local federal-aid Safety apportionments and OA were transferred to OFR per Reference 2.5h from August 17-18, 2022, and Reference 3.12 from June 28-29, 2023, California Transportation Commission meetings, in exchange for State Highway Account (SHA) funds. The transfer and exchange is allowed per Senate Bill (SB) 137 (Chapter 639 of the 2019 Statutes), effective October 8, 2019, which authorized the Department to allow up to \$100,000,000 of federal Local Assistance funds to be exchanged for SHA funds. The purpose of the exchange is to fund local Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) projects with State and local funds. The exchange will lead to increased efficiency for local agencies by reducing the time and resources needed to deliver HSIP projects.

 The Riverside County Transportation Commission (RCTC) and the San Bernardino County Transportation Authority (SBCTA) entered into a transfer agreement dated May 22, 2023, for RCTC to transfer \$15,000,000 OA to SBCTA for the Interstate 15 Corridor Freight and Express Lans Project Contract 1. The same amount of CMAQ apportionment will also be transferred and is reflected on RCTC's and SBCTA's Monthly CMAQ/STBGP Activity report.
- ¹⁰The Merced County Association of Governments (MCAG) and the San Joaquin Council of Governments (SJCOG) entered into a transfer agreement dated June 23, 2023, for MCAG to transfer \$160,000 OA to SJCOG for the purposed of funding a shared ridesharing service. The same amount of CMAQ apportionment will also be transferred and is reflected on MCAG's and SJCOG's Monthly CMAQ/STBGP Activity report.

2024 REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

DESCRIPTION:

Every two years in the odd-numbered year, regional transportation planning agencies are to submit a Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) to the California Transportation Commission (CTC) in December of the same odd-numbered year for their later approval early the following year. The Transportation Technical Advisory Committee has reviewed this item.

DISCUSSION:

At the January 25-26, 2023 meeting, the California Transportation Commission (CTC) initiated the 2024 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (2024 RTIP) process to develop a statewide 2024 State Transportation Improvement Program (2024 STIP) for projects of regional significance. The order of this process is 1) CTC develops a statewide 5-Year regional share fund estimate; 2) CTC updates 2024 STIP guidelines; 3) regions submit RTIP's; and 4) the CTC consolidates RTIP's and approves the 2024 STIP.

This month – Staff is circulating the 2024 RTIP Capital Improvement Program – baseline version 2, based on current project updates. Staff attended the CTC 2024 STIP Fund Estimate and Guidelines Workshop on July 19, 2023. The schedule below was updated to reflect the schedule in the draft STIP guidelines. The latest draft fund estimate, which proposes County Shares for regional agencies in the 2024 RTIP, is attached. The final fund estimate and STIP guidelines are expected to be adopted at the August 16-17 CTC meeting. Staff is preparing for the August 23rd 2024 RTIP workshop where the 2024 RTIP administrative draft capital improvement program will be presented.

The process for the region is to 1) establish new programming capacity defined by the state's fund estimate; 2) assess current regional project needs including cost estimate updates; 3) develop a proposed program of projects; and 4) regionally adopt the 2024 RTIP in November 2023, for submission to the CTC by December 15, 2023.

Current 2022 STIP as Adopted - Kern COG projects in the current 2022 STIP include highway capacity projects on State Routes 46, 58 and 99. The new SR 58 Truck Climbing Lane project was added to the 2022 STIP using CRRSAA / COVID funding. The Truck Climbing Lanes project on State Route 58 east of Bakersfield is considered a partnership project with Caltrans, with the intent of receiving SHOPP funding in future cycles for the construction phase. SR 46 widening work was advanced in the 2022 STIP to include construction funding for Segments 4B and 4C. These last 2 segments, once constructed, will complete the delivery of the last Phase 4, 5-mile segment. Phases 1, 2, and 3 are constructed. The Hageman Flyover project was programmed for construction in the 2022 RTIP. But the project has experienced delays. A STIP amendment was subsequently submitted by Kern COG to move funding from the Hageman Flyover to a new freeway to freeway connector project at the SR 58 and 99 freeway interchange. The STIP amendment was approved at the January 25-26, 2023 CTC meeting.

NEW - SR 58/99 Connector	New project added to the 2022 STIP. This project was approved at the January 25-26, 2023, CTC meeting, as a STIP amendment and will fund the construction phase for the new connector. The City of Bakersfield is the lead for this work.

These projects are part of the 2022 State Transportation Improvement Program, and their funding activity is tracked by the CTC, every two years, through an updated document called Report of STIP Balances County and Interregional Shares, or the Orange Book. Attachment A of this report includes the 2022 Orange Book page for the Kern Region. The CTC will provide an update for the 2024 RTIP cycle sometime in the months ahead.

DESCRIPTION:

CMAQ applications were due July 17th and Kern COG staff has prepared a draft application log. A total of 19 applications were received by the deadline, requesting \$49.2 million in CMAQ funding. The Transportation Technical Advisory Committee has reviewed this item.

DISCUSSION:

Background

CMAQ, established in the 1991 Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA), remains in the federal transportation legislation for use at the regional level. CMAQ funding can be used to maintain and improve the existing transportation system, expand the system to reduce congestion, and to establish programs and projects that will assist the region in reducing mobile emissions and help meet federal air quality standards. Kern COG's *Chapter 5 CMAQ Policy and Procedure*, as last updated and approved by Kern COG's Board of Directors on November 17, 2016, will be referenced throughout this programming cycle.

On March 16, 2023, the Transportation Planning Policy Committee (TPPC) approved the timeline and funding targets for this CMAQ call for projects cycle. This cycle included funding for the Carbon Reduction Program (CRP). About \$26.4 million in CMAQ and CRP funding was available for fiscal years 23-24, 24-25, and 25-26.

Status Update

CMAQ applications were due July 17, 2023. Kern COG staff has prepared a draft application log (attached). A total of 19 applications were received by the deadline, requesting \$49.2 million in CMAQ funding. A CMAQ application summary and applications received were posted on July 25, 2023 to the Kern COG website at https://www.kerncog.org/category/docs/ftip/.

The next steps are for Kern COG staff to review application information received, provide comments to applicants, and facilitate TTAC peer review prior to developing the CMAQ Program of Projects. Upcoming activities/dates include:

- Kern COG staff to transmit questionable applications for Caltrans eligibility review
- TTAC subcommittee may submit comments to rpacheco@kerncog.org by September 8, 2023

• Comments received will be circulated to the respective applicant. Responses from the applicants will be discussed at the TTAC subcommittee review workshop tentatively scheduled for October 11, 2023 at 10:00 AM.

Kern COG staff will not circulate the draft program of projects until after the TTAC subcommittee review of applications. The Draft Program of Projects is expected to be presented to TTAC and TPPC in January 2024. Approval of the Final Program of Projects is expected February 2024. Once approved, the projects will then be incorporated into the Federal Transportation Improvement Program.

Draft Amendment No. 7 revises the State Highway/Regional Choice Program, State Highway Operation and Protection Program, Transit Program, and Non-Motorized. Kern COG published a notice of public hearing and opened the 14-day public comment period August 4, 2023. The public hearing is scheduled for 6:30 PM August 17, 2023. Comments may be submitted in writing no later than August 18, 2023. No Kern COG Board action is required.
