Section 1. Current/Upcoming Project Status and Information

Projects of Public Importance in or near Construction:

New Project Work:

- **Keene Guardrail Repair** On State Route 58 between Hart Flat Road and Broome Road west of the city of Tehachapi, crews will repair guardrail at various locations in both directions *Monday through Friday from 8:00 am to 6:00 pm*.
- **Tehachapi Utility Work** On State Route 202 (Tucker Road) between W. Valley Boulevard and Tehachapi Boulevard, utility crews will bury fiber optic cable on the eastbound shoulder *Monday through Friday from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm*.

On Going Project Work

- Ridgecrest Sewer Replacement On State Route 178 E between French Avenue and Gemstone Street, crews continue to replace a sewer line Monday through Friday from 7:00 am to 4:00 pm. Drivers could experience brief delays.
- **Tehachapi Maintenance Station** This project is under construction and is 26% complete. The Project should be completed approximately 2/28/2025.

Section 2: Additional Information:

General Road Information:

- State Route 178 Culvert Replacement Project:
 - This culvert placement project is now completed. The project received nearly \$180,000 in funding from Senate Bill 1 (SB 1) and replaced two metal culverts east of Canebrake, with updated culverts which are larger and have a long, life expectancy. The project has also adjusted a side slope, which will improve the drive for motorists.
 - Construction on the project was completed at the end of January 2024.
- As usual, maintenance crews are always monitoring State Route 58 in rotating shifts during winter storms.

Section 3: PID Outreach Information:

- State Route 202 CAPM Golden Hills Complete Streets Project
 - This PID is currently being developed and scheduled for completion by May 2024.
 The project consists of pavement improvements and complete streets elements,

such as bicycle and pedestrian improvements. Other improvements include ADA improvements.

Tehachapi Pavement Project

This PID is currently being developed and scheduled for completion by May 2024.
 The project consists mainly of pavement improvements, culvert replacements, and is currently being evaluated for the inclusion of possible climate resiliency design features.

• California City Blvd. Project

 This Non-SHOPP PID that is currently being developed and scheduled for completion before May 2024. The project consists of a proposed interchange at SR 58/Cal City Blvd and intersection improvements.

Section 4: Public Announcements:

 Clean California – Tire Recycling: Caltrans will host a Tire Recycling Event as part of the Clean CA campaign at the Ridgecrest, Boron, Mojave-Rosamond, and Tehachapi landfills on March 2nd, May 4th, and June 8th. More information can be found at our website.

Section 5: Grants:

- District 09 submitted an ATTAIN grant application on February 2nd to fund Intelligent
 Transportation System (ITS) elements including Changeable Message Signs (CMS) and
 a real-time traffic monitoring system that would keep SR 58 travelers informed of
 Tehachapi Pass conditions.
- Also requested as part of the project is funding an Evacuation Capacity Analysis of the Greater Tehachapi Region. If funded, the ATTAIN project would strongly align with the Kern COG C-CAMS project phase 1 Tehachapi Pass focus.

Centennial Corriodor Ribbon Cutting

• The city is planning for opening the east / west portion this weekend – the connection to SR 99 is pushed beyond this weekend

• Clean CA Update:

- For Kern Co's Local Grant project Heritage Park Beautification Groundbreaking is scheduled for February 21, 2024
- The Kern Regional Transit bus shelter contract was executed and KRT received their Notice to Proceed.
- SR 204 Road Diet project was repackaged and is currently advertising. Bid opening is scheduled for March 6, 2024
 - o Was readvertised on 1/29/24. We anticipate the project to go to construction in the Summer 2024.
- Garces Circle Contractor has been selected. Awaiting final documents from the Contractor to

award.

- McFarland/Delano project is scheduled to begin construction the week of 2/19 or 2/26. Contractor is working on starting on the artwork requirements in this project – walking trail included.
- SR 99/California Ave project was executed at the end of January to PK Construction fencing under the bridge and mural on the abutment wall

Storm Work:

Ker-SR 155 emergency project:

Commuter alert going out either tomorrow or Friday. SR 155 is going to be closed for culvert placement, it was pre-fabricated so they're taking a weekend to install it. Starting 5pm Friday the 23rd through 6am Monday the 26th. We should be approaching the finish line on this one. There's going to be some paving on that section to follow after the culvert placement.

06-0X770 - SR 46/SR 43 intersection Improvements

Project to install roundabout has been combined with adjacent Route 46 Roadway improvement. Project is currently in Design Phase. Anticipated to begin construction in Spring of 2025.

06-0Q9204 - Old US 99 to White Lane SR 99 rehabilitation project

Project currently in construction: Work is about 95% complete; final striping in Progress, other miscellaneous work; final landscaping work in progress.

Expected completion of roadwork work: early March 2024 Plant establishment will begin after roadwork completion

06-0S050 - California Aqueduct 166 Bridge Rehabilitation:

The project proposes to rehabilitate the existing bridge by retrofitting the bridge and fortifying the column support system that is currently sinking. It is anticipated that the bridge would need to be shut down to traffic for 90 days during construction in mid-2025.

Project achieved RTL Date: 1/29/2024

Awarding and contract approval in August of this year. There will be about a 9 month delayed start as contractor pursues encroachment permits with DWR so we are looking at approximately a May 2025 start date and finish by the end of that year.

06-0X380 - Maricopa Highway CAPM

This project will rehabilitate approximately 9 miles of pavement from SR 33 to Capello Street.

Advertised and will award any day. Griffith Company low bidder. Start late Spring

06-0X760 - Taft Left Turn Channelization

Install left-turn channelization on SR-119 at the Kern Street/Airport Road

The project completed construction on 01/31/2024.

06-0V610 - Pumpkin Center 3R Rehab

On SR 119 near Pumpkin Center from Ashe Road to SR 119/SR 99.

The project will restore the pavement to a state of good repair and extend the remaining service life of the pavement by an additional period of 20 years.

The project is currently in PS&E and ROW phase. Anticipating ROW Cert 3 with Workaround 5/2024 due to several parcels in condemnation. RTL target date is 5/2024 and advertise in the summer

- 1. A. The ADMINISTERING AGENCY will advertise, award and administer this project in accordance with the current published Local Assistance Procedures Manual.
 - B. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees that it will only proceed with work authorized for specific phase(s) with an "Authorization to Proceed" and will not proceed with future phase(s) of this project prior to receiving an "Authorization to Proceed" from the STATE for that phase(s) unless no further State or Federal funds are needed for those future phase(s).
 - C. STATE and ADMINISTERING AGENCY agree that any additional funds which might be made available by future Federal obligations will be encumbered on this PROJECT by use of a STATE-approved "Authorization to Proceed" and Finance Letter.  - D. Award information shall be submitted by the ADMINISTERING AGENCY to the District Local Assistance Engineer within 60 days of project contract award and prior to the submittal of the ADMINISTERING AGENCY'S first invoice for the construction contract.

Failure to do so will cause a delay in the State processing invoices for the construction phase. Attention is directed to Section 15.6 "Award Package" of the Local Assistance Procedures Manual.

E. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees, as a minimum, to submit invoices at least once every six months commencing after the funds are encumbered for each phase by the execution of this Project Program Supplement Agreement, or by STATE's approval of an applicable Finance Letter. STATE reserves the right to suspend future authorizations/obligations for Federal aid projects, or encumbrances for State funded projects, as well as to suspend invoice payments for any on-going or future project by ADMINISTERING AGENCY if PROJECT costs have not been invoiced by ADMINISTERING AGENCY for a six-month period.

If no costs have been invoiced for a six-month period, ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees to submit for each phase a written explanation of the absence of PROJECT activity along with target billing date and target billing amount.

ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees to submit the final report documents that collectively constitute a "Report of Expenditures" within one hundred eighty (180) days of PROJECT completion. Failure of ADMINISTERING AGENCY to submit a "Final Report of Expenditures" within 180 days of PROJECT completion will result in STATE imposing sanctions upon ADMINISTERING AGENCY in accordance with the current Local Assistance Procedures Manual.

- F. Administering Agency shall not discriminate on the basis of race, religion, age, disability, color, national origin, or sex in the award and performance of any Federal-assisted contract or in the administration of its DBE Program Implementation Agreement. DESCRIPTION:

Pursuant to Kern COG policy, the Council shall review and approve grant-funding agreements. Caltrans has included \$79,677 Regional Surface Transportation Program funding (with \$10,323 local match) in its FY 2023/24 budget to fund the agency's Regional Traffic Count Program.

DISCUSSION:

A Memorandum of Understanding establishing the Kern Regional Traffic Count program was approved by the Kern COG Board in January 2004 and is currently included in the 2023 FTIP for the 2023-24 federal fiscal year and the 2024-2025 Overall Work Program Work Element 603.2. This agreement will fund Kern COG's Regional Traffic Count Program for fiscal year 2024-25. Kern COG staff is requesting the approval of the attached Program Supplement No. F048 and Kern COG Resolution 24-07.

Background - Traffic monitoring and pavement management are federally mandated in the recent transportation bills. In addition to traffic monitoring, traffic volume data obtained by traffic counters is used to validate the regional transportation model and used for engineering and planning purposes by local agencies. Traffic counts are used in the annual pavement management report that provides technical data on road samples throughout Kern County. This grant will provide funding for a regional traffic count program that was identified by the Kern Regional Transportation Modeling Subcommittee as necessary to improve data in the regional transportation model while reducing duplicative traffic counting efforts. Recently bike and pedestrian data collection has been added to the program, which should make our region more competitive for state resources, while ensuring that limited resources are focused on areas with the greatest need. The data collected from these contracts are available on the Kern COG website at: https://www.kerncog.org/traffic-counts/.

Every sub-recipient receiving PROJECT funds under this AGREEMENT shall comply with 2 CFR, Part 200, 23 CFR, 48 CFR Chapter 1, Part 31, Local Assistance Procedures, Public Contract Code (PCC) 10300-10334 (procurement of goods), PCC 10335-10381 (non-A&E services), and other applicable STATE and FEDERAL regulations.
- J. Any PROJECT costs for which ADMINISTERING AGENCY has received payment or credit that are determined by subsequent audit to be unallowable under 2 CFR, Part 200, 23 CFR, 48 CFR, Chapter 1, Part 31, and other applicable STATE and FEDERAL regulations, are subject to repayment by ADMINISTERING AGENCY to STATE.
- K. STATE reserves the right to conduct technical and financial audits of PROJECT WORK and records and ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees, and shall require its contractors and subcontractors to agree, to cooperate with STATE by making all appropriate and relevant PROJECT records available for audit and copying as required by the following paragraph:

ADMINISTERING AGENCY, ADMINISTERING AGENCY'S contractors and subcontractors, and STATE shall each maintain and make available for inspection and audit by STATE, the California State Auditor, or any duly authorized representative of STATE or the United States all books, documents, papers, accounting records, and other evidence pertaining to the performance of such contracts, including, but not limited to, the costs of administering those various contracts and ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall furnish copies thereof if requested. All of the above referenced parties shall make such AGREEMENT, PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT, and contract materials available at their respective offices at all reasonable times during the entire PROJECT period and for three (3) years from the date of submission of the final expenditure report by the STATE to the FHWA.

L. ADMINISTERING AGENCY, its contractors and subcontractors shall establish and maintain a financial management system and records that properly accumulate and segregate reasonable, allowable, and allocable incurred PROJECT costs and matching funds by line item for the PROJECT. The financial management system

- of ADMINISTERING AGENCY, its contractors and all subcontractors shall conform to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles, enable the determination of incurred costs at interim points of completion, and provide support for reimbursement payment vouchers or invoices set to or paid by STATE.
- M. ADMINISTERING AGENCY is required to have an audit in accordance with the Single Audit Act of 2 CFR 200 if it expends \$750,000 or more in Federal Funds in a single fiscal year of the Catalogue of Federal Domestic Assistance.
- N. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees to include all PROGRAM SUPPLEMENTS adopting the terms of this AGREEMENT in the schedule of projects to be examined in ADMINISTERING AGENCY's annual audit and in the schedule of projects to be examined under its single audit prepared in accordance with 2 CFR, Part 200.
- O. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall not award a non-A&E contract over \$5,000, construction contracts over \$10,000, or other contracts over \$25,000 [excluding professional service contracts of the type which are required to be procured in accordance with Government Code sections 4525 (d), (e) and (f)] on the basis of a noncompetitive negotiation for work to be performed under this AGREEMENT without the prior written approval of STATE. Contracts awarded by ADMINISTERING AGENCY, if intended as local match credit, must meet the requirements set forth in this AGREEMENT regarding local match funds.
- P. Any subcontract entered into by ADMINISTERING AGENCY as a result of this AGREEMENT shall contain provisions B, C, F, H, I, K, and L under Section 2 of this agreement.
- 3. Appendix E of the Title VI Assurances (US DOT Order 1050.2A)

During the performance of this agreement, the ADMINISTERING AGENCY, ADMINISTERING AGENCY'S contractors and subcontractor, (hereinafter referred to as the "contractor") agrees to comply with the following nondiscrimination statutes and authorities; including but not limited to:

Pursuant to California Code of Regulations Section 6644, Kern Council of Governments (Kern COG) shall determine and advise all prospective claimants of the amounts of all area apportionments from the Transportation Development Act (TDA) Local Transportation Fund and State Transit Assistance Fund for the upcoming fiscal year. Total TDA related funding for FY 2024-2025 is estimated to be \$67,172,918.07.

DISCUSSION:

Based upon funding estimates prepared by the Kern County Auditor-Controller for the Local Transportation Fund #24075 and by the Controller of the State of California for the State Transit Assistance Fund #24076, Kern COG anticipates TDA funding for FY 2024-2025 to be as follows:

PUC section 99313 allocations are based on the latest available annual population estimates from the Department of Finance. Pursuant to PUC section 99314.10, the PUC section 99314 allocations are based on the State Controller's Office (SCO) transmittal letter, Reissuance of the FY 2020-21 STA Allocation Estimate, dated August 1, 2023. Pursuant to PUC section 99314.3, each TPA is required to allocate funds to the STA-eligible operators in the area of its jurisdiction.

According to the FY 2024-25 proposed California Budget, the estimated amount of STA funds budgeted is \$931,305,000. SCO anticipates the first quarter's allocation will be paid by November 30, 2024. Please refer to the schedule for the amounts that relate to your agency.

UPDATE: SB 375 GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSION REDUCTION FROM PASSENGER VEHICLES AND ADOPTION TIMELINE FOR THE 2026 RTP

DESCRIPTION:

The Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) is required to be updated every 4-years and contains a long range 24-year transportation expenditure portfolio fulfilling numerous policies and regulations including but not limited to public involvement, social equity, air quality conformity, congestion management, and Senate Bill (SB) 375 per capita greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction targets. This standing item is regularly reviewed by the Regional Planning Advisory Committee.

DISCUSSION:

This discussion provides an update on the activity related to the RTP and the SB 375 Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS). The report is updated regularly with the most recent developments listed first.

February 20, 2024 – California Air Resources Board (ARB) provided another email re-confirming that they officially accept Kern COG's 2022 SCS, and provided a draft of 11 recommendations for the 2026 SCS. No estimate on when their final acceptance letter will be submitted.

January 9, 2024 and November 2, 2023 – ARB provided an email updates on the status of Kern COG's promised 2022 RTP/SCS acceptance letter. A key upper management review person is not available this month pushing the issuance of the final letter into 2024, 7-months after ARB indicated acceptance of Kern COG's SCS in their June 13th email.

August 10, 2023 - ARB staff announced at the quarterly San Joaquin Valley Inter-Agency Consultation meeting that Kern, Stanislaus, and Tulare COGs have received their approval and will receive official documentation in September. Fresno and San Joaquin COGs have completed their reviews and are in the process of making some required board actions before they can receive their official approval. Kings, Madera, and Merced are still under review by ARB staff.

July 26, 2023 – 2026 RTP/SCS Roundtable Meeting was held for environmental, equity, business & industry groups on the public outreach process at Kern COG and included 14 representatives from the Delores Huerta Foundation, Central California Asthma Collaborative, Sierra Club, Home Builders Association, Golden Empire Transit, Caltrans, County Public Works, and staff from the cities of McFarland, Taft, and Wasco.

July 13, 2023 - ARB staff emailed Kern COG and the California, the final acceptance letter is still working its way through upper management reviews and may not be issued till September due to staffing and vacation issues.

June 15, 2023 – Kern COG Board approved the 2023 Public Involvement Procedures document after a 45-day public review. The document is online at https://www.kerncog.org/policies/.

June 13, 2023 – ARB staff emailed Kern COG and the California Transportation Commission that "the SCS is officially approved." However, the final acceptance letter is still working its way through upper management reviews and will take several weeks before it is issued.

May 19, 2023 – ARB staff acknowledged receipt of the requested transmittal letter signed by the Kern COG Chair, and associated TPPC staff report. ARB staff indicated they would provide a status update by May 31, and try to meet Kern COG's request for an expedited review by June 8, but that they could not commit to any date earlier than June 27.

May 5, 2023 - Kern COG submitted a draft of a Kern COG TPPC staff report and transmittal letter to ARB with a request for the Kern COG Chair to sign. The item was approved by the Board on May 18, 2023, and signed by the Chair. The letter documents technical changes that do not affect the adopted RTP/SCS text or conclusions. The document contains updates from the November 2022 SCS technical data submittal to ARB consistent with ARB guidelines.

May 1, 2023 – Kern COG circulated the draft Public Involvement Procedure for 45-day public review period to be concluded on June 15. In addition, the Kern COG Executive Director and other COG directors from the San Joaquin Valley met with the SJV representative on the California Air Resources Board. At that meeting ARB staff indicated that Kern was close to receiving the acceptance finding for their SCS.

April 26, 2023 – Kern COG submitted to ARB a cover letter and revised technical methodology data submittal with all the requested updates since the November data submittal. ARB requested that the Kern COG's chair's signature be approved by the Kern COG Board,

April 17, 2023 – Kern COG web conferenced with ARB staff for the 14th time in 3 years to discuss the 2022 SCS technical methodology. One final methodology issue remains out of 27 identified in CARB's January 20th memorandum. Additional adjustments were made to the elasticity used to adjust the hybrid NCST tool method used by Fresno COG. Documentation of the adjustment was submitted to ARB on April 18, 2023. ARB is required to provide their findings and recommendations 2 months after the submitted package from Nov. 29, 2023, is found complete.

February 17, March 29, April 7, April 14, 2023 – Kern COG web conferenced with ARB to further refine SCS modeling methodology..

January 20, 2023 – ARB responded to Kern COGs SCS technical methodology submittal from November 29, 2022 with questions. A meeting was held on January 24, 2023, to clarify questions.

December 16, 2022 – The 2022 RTP/Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP) short range transportation program air quality conformity was federally approved.

November 29, 2022 – Kern COG submitted the technical methodology data package to the ARB.

July 21, 2022 - the Kern COG Board adopted the 2022 RTP/SCS and associated documents. The documents are available on the Kern COG website at https://www.kerncog.org/category/docs/rtp/.

March 22, 2018 - ARB adopted new SB375 Targets for the third cycle RTP/SCS to be effective October 1, 2018. Next ARB target setting will be during the 2022-2026 window.

The letters document methodological changes that make it difficult to compare the 2014 RTP results with the latest modeling refinements.

DESCRIPTION:

The 2024-2050 Growth Forecast Draft Report is available for review and public comment on Kern COG's webpage https://www.kerncog.org/estimates-and-projections/. Public comments are due by April 5th, 2024. The Regional Planning Advisory Committee has reviewed this item.

DISCUSSION:

Background

The Regional Growth Forecast Defined - The Kern COG regional growth forecast is a long-range projection for the countywide total population. The population total is used to develop housing, employment, school enrollment, and income forecasts. The forecast is used for local transportation and air quality planning as well as voluntarily by the member agencies for a variety of long-range planning activities. This forecast revision will serve as the growth assumption for the 2026 Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy (RTP/SCS). The forecast is used as a control target by the modeling committee and RPAC for distribution of socio-economic data throughout the county sub areas. The forecast is based on Census Data and California Department of Finance (DOF) estimates for the base year. Per Government Code § 65584.01, if the growth forecast is more than 1.5% above or below DOF projections, Kern COG will need to provide a detailed explanation why the forecast differs and work with DOF to agree on the forecast methodology for the next regional housing needs analysis cycle as part of the 2030 RTP/SCS.

Review Requirements – The Kern COG Policy and Procedure Manual states:

"Socio-Economic Forecast Data – Countywide forecasts for households, employment and other socio-economic data shall be updated not less than 3 years from the time of the Socio-economic forecast. A minimum of three years between Countywide forecast revisions is needed to allow responsible state and federal agencies time to complete their review of large environmental documents without major changes to transportation circulation modeling results..."

The Kern COG adopted Public Policy and Procedure manual requires an advertised notice of public meetings/workshops regarding the regional growth forecast and 30-day public comment period. Kern COG has also met with some local agency staff including County, Bakersfield, and Shafter. Verbal input has also been received from the Home Builders Association and Tejon Ranch. Additionally, extensive opportunities for public comment on the forecast will be provided as part of the 2026 Regional Transportation Plan adoption.

Committee Oversight – The Kern COG Transportation Modeling sub-committee and the Regional Planning Advisory Committee (RPAC) will provide oversight during the growth forecast update. The committees currently meet together and are also responsible for sub-area distribution of the growth forecast following the adoption. The regional growth forecast will be presented to the Transportation Technical Advisory Committee (TTAC) concurrently, and then to the Transportation Planning Policy Committee/Kern COG Board for final adoption.

Draft Regional Growth Forecast Report – The Draft Report is available for public review on Kern COG's website: https://www.kerncog.org/estimates-and-projections/. The primary forecasts of the regional growth forecast are for the number of households, population, housing units, and employment. The report also provides forecast data demographic characteristics including: age distribution, housing units by type, average household size, household income, race and ethnicity.

The draft report shows Kern's total population reaching 925,000 by 2027 and by 2050 the population is expected to be not quite 975,000. The number of households are expected to increase to just over 348,000 by 2050 from 281,000 in 2022. Total employment is forecasted to grow from 347,299 in 2022 to 420,180 in 2050.

Notably, the draft report builds on data from the US Census Bureau 2020 Decennial Census found that the average household size in the Kern region has fallen to 3.14 people per household in 2022. The household size of 3.14 data is substantially lower than earlier forecasts previously anticipated or projected.

The report compares the forecasts with other forecasts, projections, and trends. The total population forecast stays within 1.5% of the latest DOF projections. The graph below depicts how the forecast for total population compares to other forecasts and projections.




Figure 1. Above image compares latest projections with previous projections from California Department of Finance (DOF) and Kern COG.

Draft Amendment No. 13 revises the Transit Program. Documentation associated with this amendment is provided as indicated below.
