<u>Comment:</u> A statewide biennial local streets and roads report is completed to help direct road maintenance funding to local jurisdictions. Caltrans has requested that Kern COG contribute their proportionate share of Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPAs) Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program funding of \$5,140.

<u>Action</u>: Recommend to the Transportation Planning Policy Committee authorize Executive Director to sign attached letter agreeing to Kern COG to contribute \$5,140 toward the expense

of the Biennial Local Streets and Roads 2025 Survey report and to sign the corresponding resolution. ROLL CALL VOTE.

V. <u>FY 2023-24 TDA Public Transit Claim – City of Shafter</u> <u>FY 2024-25 TDA Public Transit Claim – City of Arvin</u> (Banuelos)

<u>Comment:</u> According to California Public Utilities Code Section 99260 et seq., and Kern COG TDA Rules and Regulations, eligible organizations may submit a claim for the purpose of supporting public transit systems and streets and roads. City of Shafter and City of Arvin have submitted TDA Public Transit claims which total \$ 1,312,127.

VII. Regional Early Action Planning 2.0 Grant Status (Napier)

<u>Comment:</u> The Governor in AB 130, 2025-2026 Budget extended the Regional Early Action Planning (REAP) 2.0 grant deadlines as follows:

- Expenditure deadline: Extended by six (6) months from June 30, 2026 to December 31, 2026.
- Final invoice submission deadline: Extended by fifteen (15) months from March 31, 2026 to June 30, 2027 (for expenditures up to December 31, 2026).
- Final report submission deadline: Extended by six (6) months from December 31, 2026 to June 30, 2027.
- In addition, for MPOs only If an MPO has unexpended funds after the expenditure deadline, the department may, no later than December 31, 2027 (previously 2026), reallocate those funds to another eligible MPO, for reimbursement for other expenditures incurred by the expenditure deadline, up to their original allocation amount.

All other terms, including reporting deadlines, remain unchanged.

III. APPROVAL OF DISCUSSION SUMMARY: Minutes from meeting of September 3, 2025. There were no comments or questions from the committee members. Mr. Arnold made a motion to approve the discussion summary, Chairman Archer seconded the motion. Ms. Invina-Jayasiri performed a roll call vote, and the motion was carried out unanimously.

IV. Congestion Mitigation And Air Quality (CMAQ) Program – Workshop Follow-Up Mr. Valle reported Kern COG held a CMAQ Workshop on October 15th. Attendees discussed the applications under review. The staff report includes activities since the workshop and upcoming activities. After coordination with Caltrans District 6, local roads are eligible under CMAQ/CRP. However, under Chapter 5 of Kern COG Project Delivery Policies and Procedures local roads are not CMAQ/CRP eligible. The Flowchart to Change Functional Classification, Functional Classification Change Request Form, and updated local road project list are provided as part of the staff report.

The action requested is that the TTAC recommend excluding local road projects from the CMAQ Call for Projects to ensure compliance with the guidelines specified in Chapter 5 of the Kern COG Project Delivery Policies and Procedures. The committee members discussed the proposed action and policy. The TTAC recommended considering the City of Wasco's project as a non-local road project in this CMAQ Call for Projects since the City of Wasco has started the process of updating the Caltrans CRS Functional Classification Map.

Chairman Archer proposed to add local road projects to the CMAQ Call for Projects contingency list, with the condition that applicants may only request funding authorization once all eligibility requirements are met. Also consider the City of Wasco's project as a non-local road project in this CMAQ Call for Projects. Mr. Arnold motioned to approve, and Mr. Marsh seconded the motion. Ms. Invina-Jayasiri performed a roll call vote, Mr. Deel abstained, Mr. Lux and Ms. Alcantar voted no, and Chairman Archer, Ms. Doravari, Mr. Rodriguez, Mr. Barnes, Mr. Hernandez, Mr. Roberts, Mr. Gonzales, Ms. Binkley, Mr. Marsh, and Mr. Arnold voted yes.

V. <u>Project Delivery Policy Letters – ATP, CMAQ, RSTP</u>

Mr. Valle reported Kern COG Project Delivery Policy states that projects in the current fiscal year need to be submitted for funding authorization by January 31st. If agencies plan to submit projects for funding authorization beyond January 31st, lead agencies are asked to submit a letter with a revised submittal schedule by January 16. Per approval from the Kern COG Board on October 19, 2023, the project delivery letters are required to be signed by the City Manager or Department Head.

A sample project delivery letter and project list are provided as part of the staff report. This item is for information only.

VI. Cycle 8 Active Transportation Program – Upcoming Statewide Call For Projects

Ms. Invina-Jayasiri provided an update on the Cycle 8 ATP Call for Projects. Virtual site visits with the CTC staff is still available. The Commission considers adoption of the Guidelines and ATP fund estimate in March CTC meeting and applications due in June 2026. She also announced a list of upcoming 2027 Cycle 8 Active Transportation Program workshops, and the Active Transportation Resource Center will be presenting a one-day training on Intro to Active Transportation Planning and Design on January 28, 2026 at Kern Council of Governments.

VII. FY 2024-25 TDA Public Transit Claim – City of Delano

Ms. Banuelos stated According to California Public Utilities Code Section 99260 et seq., and Kern COG TDA Rules and Regulations, eligible organizations may submit a claim for the purpose of supporting public transit systems and streets and roads. The City of Delano has submitted a TDA Public Transit claim which totals \$ 1,391,606.

Staff requests for the Technical Transportation Advisory Committee to review TDA Public Transit Claim for City of Delano and recommend approval to the Transportation Planning Policy Committee.

Mr. Barned motioned to approve, and Mr. Rodriguez seconded the motion. Ms. Invina-Jayasiri performed a roll call vote, and the motion was carried out unanimously.

VIII. 2026 Regional Transportation Improvement Program – Final

Ms. Enriquez reported Staff is circulating the 2026 RTIP Final as part of Attachment A to request a recommendation for approval. Since the circulation of the Draft 2026 RTIP Capital Improvement Program, two changes have been made:

- 1. SR 58 Truck Climbing Lane Phase 2 "PM 71.8-74.9" was added to the project description; \$25.371 RIP funding previously showing in FY 29/30 alone is now split between FY 29/30 and FY 30/31.
- 2. The funding shown in the "Total for 2026 RTIP Submittal" row was corrected.

Attachment A is the Final 2026 RTIP Capital Improvement Program. Staff requests TTAC recommend adoption of the 2026 RTIP Capital Improvement Program to the Transportation Planning Policy Committee as shown in Attachment A.

Mr. Arnold motioned to approve, and Mr. Hernandez seconded the motion. Ms. Invina-Jayasiri performed a roll call vote, and the motion was carried out unanimously.

IX. FY 2025-26 FTA Section 5310 Program of Projects

Ms. Enriquez stated Non-profit agencies providing transportation services are eligible to apply for funding from the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) through the Section 5310 program. Applications for twelve (12) separate projects were received from two (2) urban agencies for a total of \$1,663,000.

Staff recommend the members of the Transportation Technical Advisory Committee review the FY 2025-26 FTA Section 5310 Program of Projects (POP) and recommend to the Transportation Planning Policy Committee certify the POP as consistent with the Regional Transportation Plan and the Coordinated Human Services Transportation Plan.

Mr. Barnes motioned to approve, and Mr. Arnold seconded the motion. Ms. Invina-Jayasiri performed a roll call vote, and the motion was carried out unanimously.

X. <u>Mobility Innovations and Incentives Program - Status Report</u>

Ms. Enriquez provided a report on the mobility innovations and incentives program for the period July 1, 2025, to September 30, 2025. The report shows that as of September 30, 2025, there is a 279.20% increase in charging spaces (1,181 spaces) throughout Kern County over the July 2016 base month and year, when Kern COG began tracking electric

vehicle charging spaces. Six new locations have been identified in this reporting period, adding 131 charging spaces. She also provided an update on the EV Ready Communities project, the Fast Charge California Project application extension, staff participation in committees and workgroups, and shared information on upcoming activities.

XI. Project Delivery Policy Letters – TDA Article 3

Ms. Enriquez stated per the "Kern COG Project Delivery Policies & Procedures Chapter 2: Implementation Procedures Overview," project delivery letters are due January 16, 2026, for Transportation Development Act (TDA) Article 3 projects. Per approval from the Kern COG Board on October 19, 2023, the project delivery letters are required to be signed by the City Manager or Department Head.

A sample project delivery letter and project list are provided as part of the staff report. This item is for information only.

XII. Long Range Transportation Plan Project Listing Revisions Summary

Mr. Ball stated in November 2023, a draft 2026 CIP transportation project listing was approved by the TTAC and TPPC for use and development of the draft 2026 RTP development process. Staff is providing some updates to the approved list since 2023. Updates include some corrections to project dates, costs and incorporation of new near term funded projects. The CIP also includes unfunded projects identified as part of the Kern Area Regional Goods-movement Operations (KARGO) Study.

As Kern COG staff moves forward with public outreach and for the 2026 RTP, the CIP will continue to be subject to public comments, updates to project listings that have been delivered and other corrections or additions prior to the scheduled circulation of the entire document in Spring of 2026.

Staff is requesting TTAC provide comments to staff on this 2nd draft list by November 21, 2025. This item is for information only.

Biennial Local Streets and Roads 2025 Survey

DESCRIPTION:

A statewide biennial local streets and roads report is completed to help direct road maintenance funding to local jurisdictions. Caltrans has requested that Kern COG contribute their proportionate share of Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPAs) Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program funding of \$5,140.

DISCUSSION:

Since 2008 the biennial Statewide Local Streets and Roads survey has been sent out by the Save California Streets Coalition. Save California Streets is comprised of several organizations including the California League of Cities. More information can be found on http://www.savecaliforniastreets.org along with the 2022 report and previous reports.

Kern COG's member agencies participated in the 2025 survey.

The survey was sent by email from a consultant to public works personnel. Some of the information requested was:


- Pavement condition data
- Safety, traffic & regulatory data (e.g. storm drains, ramps etc.)
- Funding/expenditure projections

The survey shows (see the below table and map) a decline in Pavement Condition Index (PCI) from 2020 from 65 to 63 in the 2022 survey.



"Fix It First!" Pavement and Bridge Funding Strategy Stretches Road \$\$\$

Preventive maintenance is crucial to roadway and bridge longevity. Expensive damage occurs to cars because of poor road conditions. The public demands that we "Fix it First." Here are prioritized tips to catch up on roadway maintenance:

- 1) Oil all local roads every 2-years if possible This stabilizes roads at their current level of degradation and helps prevent further deterioration.
- 2) After regular maintenance is fully funded, use every eligible road maintenance funding source to repair, rehabilitate, or rebuild the worst roadways in your jurisdiction even though the funds may be eligible for other projects.
- 3) Implement a Pavement Management System
- 4) Once all roadways are up to a Pavement Condition Index (PCI) of 80 out of 100, and regular maintenance is fully funded, SB1 LSRP, RSTP, & TDA funds can be freed up and used for other eligible transportation priorities.

Maintaining roads at 80 PCI is 1/10 the cost of having to rebuild a failed roadway, allowing a region to stretch its transportation funds for other priorities. Below are funding programs for pavement and bridge maintenance.





AUTHORIZING KERN COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS TO CONTRIBUTE REGIONAL SURFACE TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM FUNDING TO THE ONGOING CALIFORNIA STATEWIDE LOCAL STREETS AND ROADS NEEDS ASSESSMENT EFFORT

WHEREAS, the Kern Council of Governments (Kern COG) is a regional transportation planning agency and a metropolitan planning organization (MPO); and

WHEREAS, a regional transportation network is comprised of local streets and roads, highways, mass transit, airports, seaports, land ports, and bicycle and pedestrian facilities; and

WHEREAS, each transportation component is critical in ensuring a seamless, safe, and efficient multi-modal transportation network in all local communities across the state; and

WHEREAS, 80% of the roads in California are locally owned and operated by cities and counties, where every trip begins and ends, and the local system is critical for safety and mobility of the traveling public, farm to market needs, multimodal needs, and commerce; and

WHEREAS, while federal and state governments regularly assess their transportation system needs, until 2008, no such data existed for the local component of California's transportation network; and

WHEREAS, transportation infrastructure is underfunded and deteriorating and existing funding sources are not sufficient to meet even basic maintenance needs, but without credible and defensible data, efforts to advocate for increased funding for transportation purposes are difficult at best; and

WHEREAS, the California Statewide Local Streets and Roads Needs Assessment provides critical analysis and information on the local transportation network's condition and funding needs; and

WHEREAS, the results of the 2024 Assessment Update, which indicate that the condition of the local transportation network is deteriorating as predicted in the 2008 California Statewide Local Streets and Roads Needs Assessment, are being used in the California Transportation Commission's efforts to study alternatives to the state gas tax as a mechanism to pay for transportation infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, it costs approximately \$715,000 to update the California Statewide Local Streets and Roads Needs Assessment report every two years; and

WHEREAS, California's regional transportation planning agencies have been financial partners since 2010 and provided ongoing technical support since 2008; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

Kern Council of Governments will contribute its proportional share towards the effort in support of the positive work that has been done to date, the usefulness of the findings of the report, and the continued use the report will serve as the collective transportation community advocates for scarce transportation revenues.

Cycle 8 Active Transportation Program – Upcoming Statewide Call for Projects

DESCRIPTION:

The California Transportation Commission (CTC) anticipates initiating the statewide Cycle 8 Active Transportation Program (ATP) Call for Projects at their March 19-20, 2026, meeting, with a project application due date of June 22, 2026.

DISCUSSION:

On August 21, 2025, CTC staff conducted a kick-off workshop to initiate and explain upcoming events for the roll-out of the 2027 Cycle 8 Active Transportation Program Call for Projects. CTC staff is offering virtual site visits on Tuesdays and Thursdays, September 2025 through March 2026. Additional information on items circulated as it becomes available. Please check the CTC ATP resource page for more information. We are providing the following information to reflect upcoming key timeline benchmarks that span from August 2025 all the way through June 2027 for the full cycle. Potential applicants should use the following links to ensure access to up-to-date information for the 2027 Cycle 8 ATP information:

The preliminary Cycle 8 funding is anticipated to be \$550 million for four years of programming for fiscal years 2027-28, 2028-29, 2029-30, and 2030-31. CTC ATP guidelines and fund estimate establish a state funding share and MPO funding share for ATP programming capacity. In response, the Kern Council of Governments has an adopted ATP project delivery policy that defers to the original application review and ranking by the state for all original state submitted applications. Kern COG does not do a separate ATP Call for Projects to use the MPO share and therefore does not adopt its own modified guidelines or requests separate applications. The timeline shown on the following page reflects the statewide call for projects and MPO segment of the process.

Regional Early Action Planning 2.0 Grant Status

DESCRIPTION:

The Governor in AB 130, 2025-2026 Budget extended the Regional Early Action Planning (REAP) 2.0 grant deadlines as follows:

- Expenditure deadline: Extended by six (6) months from June 30, 2026 to December 31, 2026.
- Final invoice submission deadline: Extended by fifteen (15) months from March 31, 2026 to June 30, 2027 (for expenditures up to December 31, 2026).
- Final report submission deadline: Extended by six (6) months from December 31, 2026 to June 30, 2027.
- In addition, for MPOs only If an MPO has unexpended funds after the expenditure deadline, the department may, no later than December 31, 2027 (previously 2026), reallocate those funds to another eligible MPO, for reimbursement for other expenditures incurred by the expenditure deadline, up to their original allocation amount.

All other terms, including reporting deadlines, remain unchanged.

DISCUSSION:

The Kern COG Board approved the following projects in November 2022:

- \$750,000 Wasco Alley Rehabilitation for ADUs
- \$230,235 Shafter Tract 6713
- \$6,000,000 Bakersfield Senior Center Affordable Senior Housing & Facility
- \$5,690,482 Arvin "Keeping it Green in the San Joaquin"

The California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) advised Kern COG on July 16, 2024, the REAP 2.0 funding had been reduced by \$30M. The funding reduction was applied evenly to all REAP 2.0 MPO applicants. The revised allocations can be seen in the Excel spreadsheet included below.

The purpose of this report is to advise the TTAC Kern COG's knowledge of the status of the projects. The Shafter Tract 6713 has been completed and the City of Shafter reimbursed \$216,692. During the reporting process in April 2025, there was no acknowledgement by the City of Bakersfield, the City of Arvin or the City of Wasco that any funding has been spent toward the projects.
